Students will learn basic theoretical underpinnings of interdependent marine science such as situated knowledge and epistemic injustice; principles including gender analysis for the practice of interdependent science in the field, and will analyze case studies from around the world.

Louise Fortmann has a professorship in rural sociology at the College of Natural Resources at the University of California, Berkeley. Her research focus is on the outcomes of natural resource use and management for individuals and communities. Her research group addresses five interrelated issues: (1) gender, (2) property, (3) poverty, (4) community control of natural resources, and (5) knowledge production.
